### Australia – a snapshot

- Population 22.7m, continent is 'same size' as USA
- A federation National government does not have jurisdiction for animal welfare
- Six states and two territories
  - responsible for welfare laws
    - Significant administrative role of local government
- Compliance and enforcement often devolved to NGOs (RSPCA, etc)



### Key issues


- Large and distributed system, complex stakeholder group
- Regulation differs between states no central legislative mechanism
- High level of community interest, not necessarily matched by knowledge
- Changing community standards and expectations
- Highly urbanised population, separated from production, nature
- Improvements must be negotiated, change is a gradual, incremental process

### Setting national policies, decisions

- The Federal Govt. represents Australia in international government forums (single country)
- The Federal Govt. can also provide leadership and assist in the development of national perspectives, policies, codes, standards
  - Council of Australian Governments and its Councils
  - Primary Industries Ministerial Council



# Australian Animal Welfare Strategy 2005-09



- Australia's blueprint to improve animal welfare - across the entire community
  - All uses of animals
- Federal Government providing approx \$1million/yr (2005-2014)
  - Shared funds/lots of in-kind



Impressive progress against the PHASE 1 Implementation Plan








#### AAWS — MISSION

MISSION: To deliver sustainable improvements in the welfare of all animals








#### **AAWS Original GOALS**

- A national approach and commitment to ensure high standards of animal welfare based on current approaches.
- Sustainable improvements in animal welfare based on national and international benchmarks, scientific evaluation & research, considering whole of community standards.
- Effective communication, education and training across all community sectors to promote improved understanding of animal welfare



#### **NEW AAWS**



- **1. ANIMALS**: The welfare needs of animals are understood and met
- 2. NATIONAL SYSTEMS: National systems deliver consistent animal welfare outcomes and give priority to ongoing improvements
- 3. PEOPLE: People make ethical decisions regarding animal welfare, supported by knowledge and skills
- **4. INTERNATIONAL:** Australia is actively engaged in international partnerships and developments to improve animal welfare (pages 21-23)

#### **AAWS Phase 2**

Scope still aimed at all key animal sectors and all sections of the community

### Phase 2 Implementation Plan

- Program logic framework, enhanced Program management
- Recognises staged progress over 4, 10, 20 years
- Identifies key activities, required resources, risks, and forecast expenditure, including contribution outside AAWS
- Improved transparency and accountability and sets performance measures for the program

### Why is it important?

- Summarises the strategy
- Outlines national priorities and planned investments
- Establishes the basis for reporting, and identifies key pieces of evidence for performance and progress
- Indentifies responsibilities and accountabilities
- Assesses primary risks
- Promotes active stakeholder engagement

4 years (objectives)	Regular internal and external reporting of progress against agreed measures, benchmarks  (monitor trends)	•Coordinated actions to address welfare issues •Avoid duplication of effort  (Act on key issues)	•Improved infrastructure, networks, resources to drive delivery of benefits for animals.  (Deliver improvements)	

### International engagement

- With Canada, USA and New Zealand through the 'QUADs'
- Strongly support OIE efforts and took 'AAWS' offshore to Middle East and Asia/Oceania to assist the development of regional animal welfare strategies
- Like Canada and New Zealand, have an animal welfare cooperation agreement with the European Union
- Jointly manage a New Zealand/Australia OIE Collaborating Centre on Animal Welfare Science and Bioethical Analysis (capacity building, training, scientific advice)

### Challenges and opportunities

- Improving communications balance of views in the community, active stakeholder engagement
- National Consistency across governments
- Indentify responsibilities, accountabilities (regulation/QA-Co-regulation)
- Industry/govts. to identify 'welfare risks' (painful husbandry procedures) and position themselves to counter campaigns

### Challenges and opportunities

- Supporting industry in making sustainable changes to welfare practices
- Engaging Retailers the 'new regulators' driving supply chain changes
- Support education and training and research and development (especially to underpin standards)
- Enhance international reputation and improve co-operation
