The Project

- The CFIA has initiated a study to develop objective criteria for use in the categorization of terrestrial animal diseases
 - To guide the governance of animal diseases at three different levels Federal,
 Provincial-Territorial and private
- Hired University of Guelph (Dr. Victoria Ng and Dr. Jan Sargeant)
 to conduct this study
 - The University's Department of Population Medicine completed a similar study ("A Stakeholder-Informed Approach to the Identification of Criteria in the Prioritisation of Zoonoses in Canada")
 - Will develop potential criteria to categorize animal diseases, using literature review, interviews and two pilot focus groups in Guelph, Ontario
- The University of Guelph started working on this project Nov 2012 to deliver
 - A list of potential criteria that can be used to categorize animal diseases and which may be applied at each level of governance





Why Undertake Such a Study?

- The initial impetus for the Study was CFIA's desire to review it's list of terrestrial animal diseases reportable under the Health of Animals Act using objective criteria
- The National Farmed Animal Health and Welfare Strategy critical element "Governance" fourth action item, suggested:
 - "Develop, negotiate, and conclude an agreement amongst the farmed animal sector, the federal government, and the provincial/territorial governments, for the shared responsibility, management, and funding of all significant diseases of the farmed animal sector"
- As the two initiatives are highly integrated, it was agreed that the NFAHWC would work with and support the CFIA as we move forward on this project





Moving Forward Together

- The NFAHWC has established a steering committee made up of Council members, to work collaboratively on the project, in an advisory capacity, with the Agency in accordance with a Terms of Reference
- Goal is to have the final report presented to the NFAHWC in April 2013 face to face meeting
- We are beginning to map out Phase II of the project for the next fiscal year, for example:
 - Conducting a study to explore the relative importance of disease criteria
 - Possibly applying them to all terrestrial animal diseases
 - Generating a priority list unique to each of the three levels of governance
