Decision-Analysis Tool for the Characterization of CFIA Involvement and Role in Animal Health Events

- PROPOSED TOOL ONLY
- Limited to the role of CFIA and Canada's CVO
- The approach may be useful for other partners
- Initial study and feedback to CFIA
- Further review with Seneca Valley Virus identified issues that needed to be addressed.
- Council open to continued input



Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea – 2014 Impact of loss of market access

- Emerging disease many unknowns
- Some producers lost market access
- Impact
 - Animal Welfare issues
 - Financial loss
 - Mental health impact



NFAHW Council Study

- Three provincial producer organizations participated – MB, ON and PEI
- Veterinary practitioners involved in the outbreak
- Provincial CVOs
- Academia
- Processing industry
- Trucking industry



Provincial Experience – not uniform

MB and PEI

- small number of cases focus on preventing spread and limiting transmission
- Loss of usual markets (domestic and export)
- Loss of access to slaughter plants
- Identified need for biosecurity for service providers
- Financial and personal stress

ON

- More cases focused on continuation of business
- More preplanning pork industry, processors, CVO
- Maintained market access
- Industry led communication re risk management in cooperation with CVO
- Financial and personal stress



Recommendations

- 1. Develop a coordinated approach to risk mitigation for an emerging disease FPT and I
- 2. Support, communicate and exercise effective and practical enhanced biosecurity
- 3. Commit to development, communication and exercising emergency preparedness
- 4. Ensure there is adequate support for producers and others
- 5. Investigate the potential of assured access to slaughter/processing plants in a disease outbreak



Preparing for an Emerging Issue

Utilized the PED study to explore with other commodities and industry groups

Related national activities:

- Canadian Animal Health Surveillance System
- Centre for Emerging and Zoonotic Disease
- Livestock Interruption Strategy
- Emergency Management Framework
- Plant and Animal Health Strategy



Recommendations

- Build on the recommendations from the Market Access (PED) study
- Focus on Early Detection, Risk Mitigation
- Recognize the integrated and collaborative nature of industry and FPT government in animal agriculture
- Must not be taken in isolation but consider other emergency preparedness activities – national, provincial and within industry



Recommendations are strongly linked with other national initiatives

The agricultural policy framework should include the scope of the recommendations
