WHAT IS ANIMAL HEALTH CANADA?

Building on direction from FPT governments in the National Plant and Animal Health Strategy, several industry leaders have agreed to champion the development of "Animal Health Canada", a new governance model built on industry-government partnership in decision making, resource sharing and program management. The goal is to strengthen Canada's capacity for animal disease prevention, preparedness, response and recovery (PPR&R) by reducing fragmentation of accountabilities, ensuring greater sustainability in resource commitments, increasing timeliness of action and planning more effectively for the future.

PROGRESS TO DATE

• 15 industry associations and companies pledging \$140,000 to support the exploration and recommendation of options

- Identify Federal/Provincial/Territorial representatives for the CEO Champions Committee and the Animal Health Canada working group
- Continue industry outreach
- Develop a terms of reference, budget and workplan for the "building phase" to be overseen by the working group in 2019

Animal Health Canada Working Group Proposed Activities:

- Identify the key desired criteria required for a new governance model for animal health in Canada
- Develop an inventory of available resources, programs and organizations that currently support animal health in Canada
- Compare the key desired criteria to the available resources, programs, and organizations that currently support animal health in Canada
- Identify the gaps in PPR&R that could be addressed through governance changes or other organizational solutions
- Undertake examination of existing models nationally and internationally that may assist in selecting a new governance model for Canada
- Propose Canadian model options for further development
