NFAHW Council update – April 2016

Teleconference April 14, 2016

Council received updates on the following work areas:

Emerging Issues

Domestic Market Access in an Emerging Disease

The paper developed on domestic market issues experienced during the Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea outbreak in 2014 was reviewed by Council. The paper will be used to consult further with commodities to validate the findings of the study in other food animals and poultry.

In the context of an emerging disease, the recommendations cover risk mitigation; emergency preparedness; biosecurity; support for producers and others affected by the event; and access to slaughter facilities. While the recommendations are broad and involve all stakeholders, lead organizations are identified.

The working group included not only members of the NFAHW council, but also various industry stakeholders, private practitioners, and government to ensure a balanced and broad analysis. The Council appreciates the input of individuals who were added to the working group for this study, their experience in the PED outbreak provided a ground level view of what happened.

Antimicrobial Use/Antimicrobial Resistance

The Council AMR document, "Antimicrobial Stewardship in Food Animals in Canada" is in final stages of preparation for distribution to all stakeholders following approval on a special Council teleconference on March 30, 2016.

The document will be used as a resource in the development of the pan-Canadian AMR Strategy which is being led by PHAC. The committee structure for the development of the pan-Canadian AMR Strategy is established and being populated. First meetings of the steering committee are anticipated for late April/early May. Specific committees are being formed to consider the three pillars identified in the Federal AMR Strategy – Surveillance, Stewardship and Innovation.

The Council will continue to work on AMU and AMR through the year through the pan-Canadian strategy process and stakeholder communications.

Transport of cull dairy cows

The National Farmed Animal Health and Welfare Council (NFAHWC) hosted an expert consultation on the management of cull dairy cows on March 23-24 in Ottawa. The consultation brought together 14 experts including producers and producer organizations, veterinarians, regulators, processors, and the livestock auction, transport and slaughter sectors.

The Council had identified the management of cull dairy cows as an important issue for animal health and welfare because these animals are often transported long distances from farm to slaughter, and they are managed under regulatory systems provincially and federally. The findings of the meeting, together with follow-up investigation during 2016-17, will help the Council to identify potential weaknesses in the current system, promising approaches used in certain provinces, and make recommendations.

The meeting was chaired by Prof. David Fraser who is leading the project along with fellow Council members Gary Bowers (a dairy producer from Quebec) and Dr. Jane Pritchard (Chief Veterinary Officer of British Columbia) with the assistance of Ms. Nicole Sillett (Dairy Farmers of Canada) and Dr. Yanne Stojkov (University of British Columbia) whose involvement is supported by the Loblaw Corporation.
